## Recovering Lent

In a recent gathering of our Diocesan Clergy our guest speaker, Brian McLaren, raised a pointed set of questions for us to consider. In all the talk of an "economic recovery," do we have in mind a recovery of what used to be? Do we hope that the economy will restore the conditions of 1999 or 2006? Or can we think of economic recovery in terms used by alcoholics and addicts, a recovery from our addictions and our broken behaviors? I thought that was a brilliant way to frame the current crisis.

It may be that this crisis has enough energy, and perhaps even pain, to help us rethink priorities and reconsider happiness. What might we do differently if our recovered economy really took seriously the impact of today's actions on generations of the future? What might change if we built into the economy the divine commandment to be stewards of the earth on God's behalf? What might we do differently in our economic practices and commerce if we took seriously Jesus' parable of the Good Samaritan as the answer to the question, "Who is my neighbor?"

The season of Lent is a time for a kind of economic recovery on a more personal level. Even so, personal recovery is always the beginning of global recovery. The disciplines of Lent are meant to help us come back into the fullness of love between ourselves and our Savior, and between ourselves and our neighbor. Lenten disciplines are simple enough to name: self denial, fasting, prayer, and scripture reading. Together they recreate a framework for focusing on the priority of our relationship with God.

For example, consider a time in your life when there was tension with someone you love. Did it help to ignore that person, or claim that the cause of the tension was all in the other person's head? Did it help to take up a hobby that meant spending less time with that person? Probably not.

In the course of any year our relationship with God suffers our personal distraction with matters of the world, with our joys and our losses, with our emotional ups and downs. We all spend more time with the newspaper than the prayer book. Just as a relationship is fed by time together, by forgiveness and forgiving, by the simple actions that show love (even if at times they are only "going through the motions"), our relationship with God is fed in the same ways.

As we act in Lent for the sake of seeking God's presence, the mystery of our relationship is that God is also seeking us. When we pay attention we are fed. When we turn to God we find God is already there, waiting for us to notice.

God bless us with a good, healthy, holy and God-lively Lent. And God bless us with the kind of economic recovery by which we can live more abundantly in love and relationships.

## The Faith of a Physicist

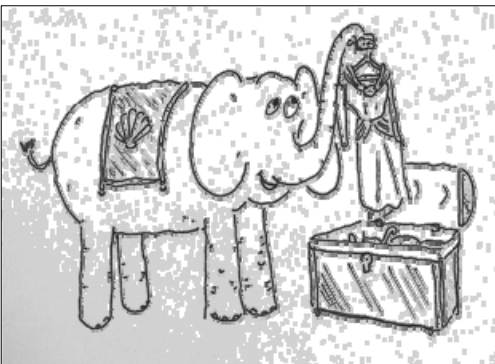
